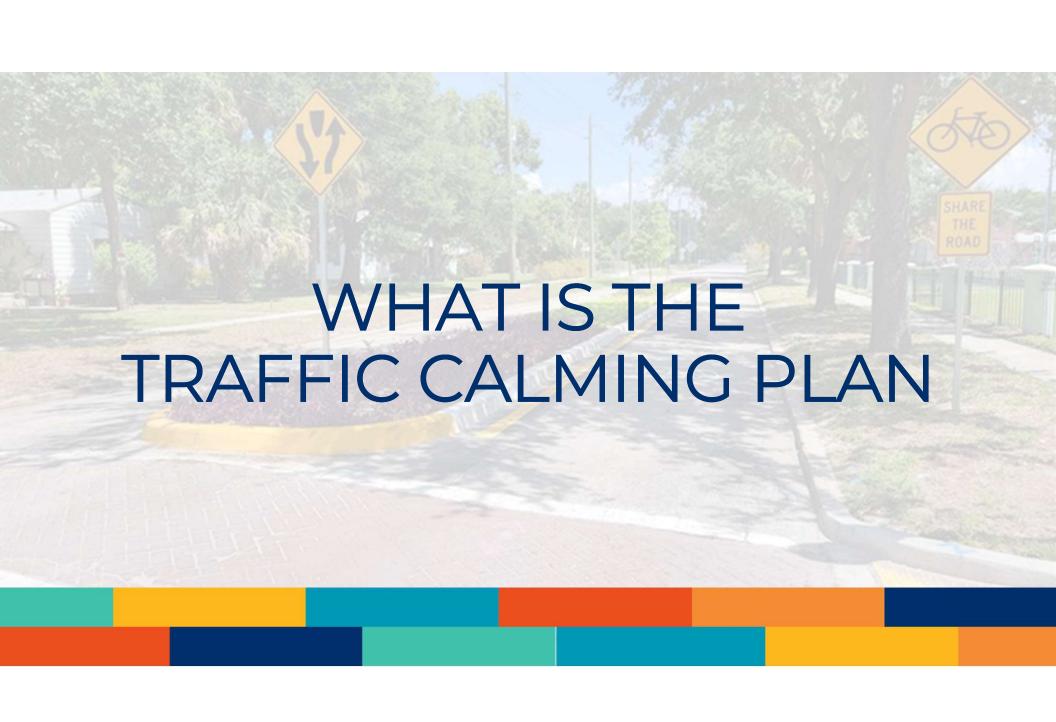

WHAT IS TRAFFIC CALMING?

Traffic calming is a set of roadway treatments that can help alter driver behavior and reduce the negative impacts motorists can have on pedestrians and cyclists.

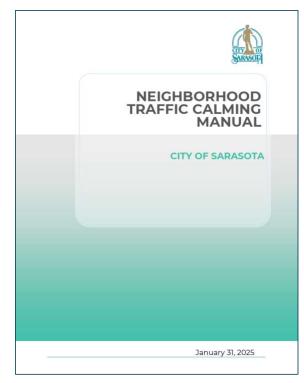
Traffic calming can help reduce speed, vehicle crashes, and increase pedestrian and bicyclist usage.



PROJECT BACKGROUND

After hearing feedback from residents, the Coalition of City Neighborhood Associations (CCNA), and elected officials, the transportation planning team updated the traffic calming program.

This program provides options for neighborhoods depending on a score and solutions matrix.



The City has had a Traffic Calming Program since the 1990s.

This survey covered information from demographics and perceived safety to project prioritization.

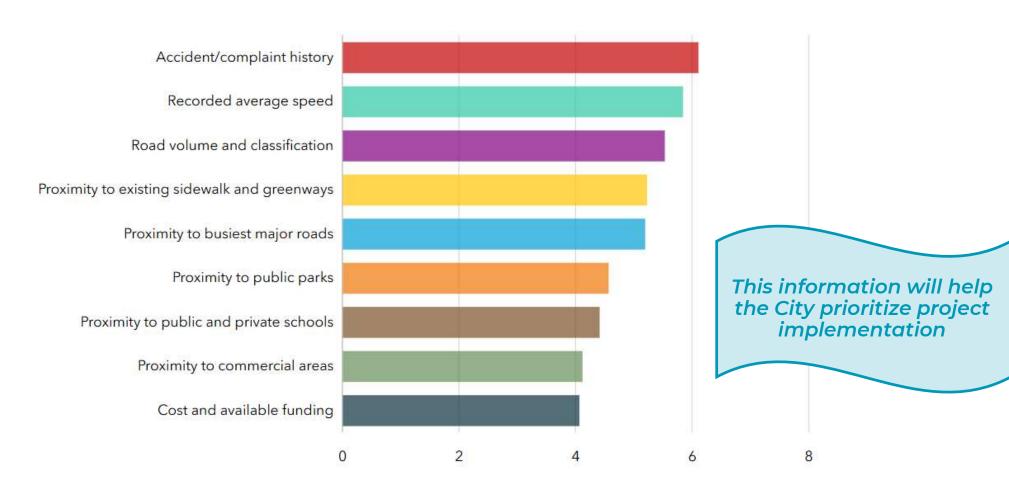
Over 500 people responded to the survey, with over 75% of respondents in favor of implementing traffic calming plans in their neighborhood.



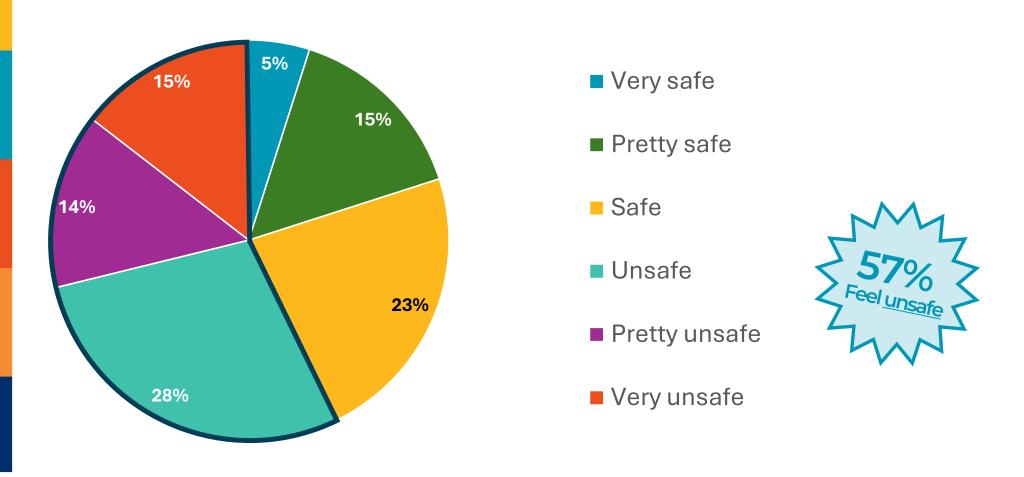

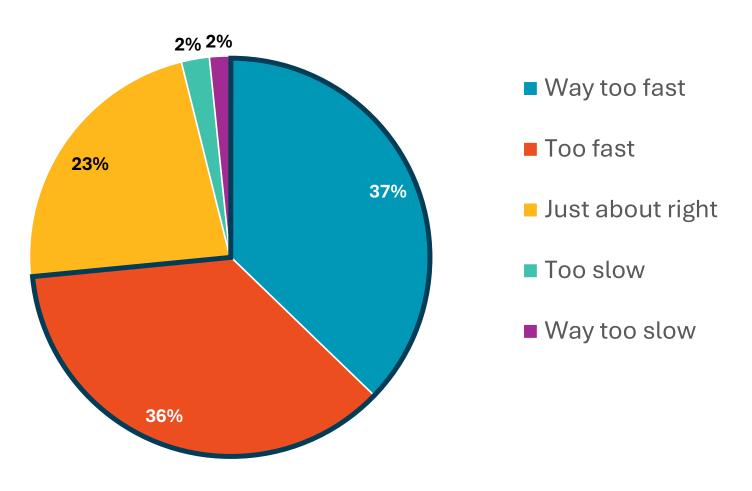
PROJECT PRIORITIZATION FACTORS



PERCEIVED RESIDENTIAL SAFETY

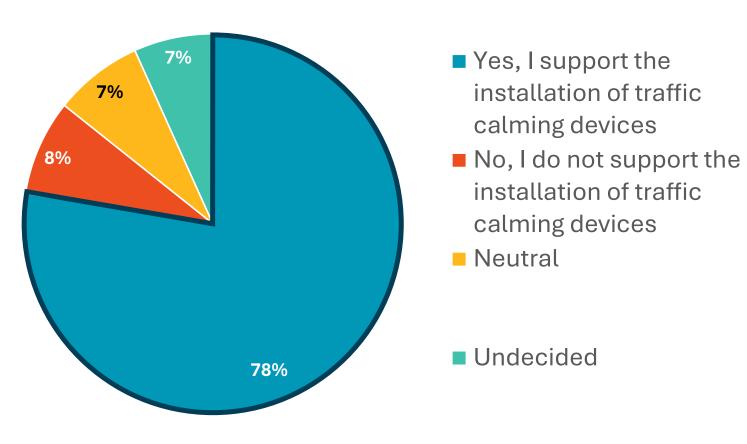


PERCEIVED RESIDENTIAL SPEED

STUDY OVERVIEW

The speed study compared the existing posted speed limits along local, collector, and arterial roadways to the 85th percentile speed data.

The goal is to identify roadway segments where the recorded 85th percentile speed exceeds the current speed limit and to determine the extent of the excess, also known as speed differential.

The analysis also included a test model that assumed all local roads have a 20 mph speed limit and compared the 85th percentile speeds.

Analysis Parameters

- January 1st December 31st, 2024
- Typical weekday (T/W/R) Weekend
- 12 AM to 6 AM
 6 AM to 9 AM (Morning Peak)
 9 AM to 3 PM
 3 PM to 7 PM (Afternoon Peak)
 7 PM to 12 AM

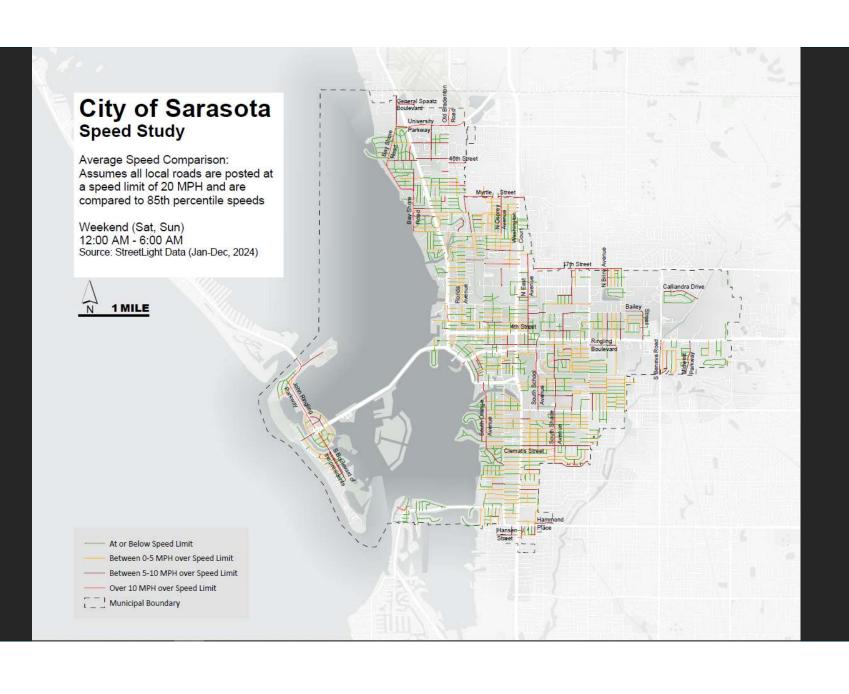








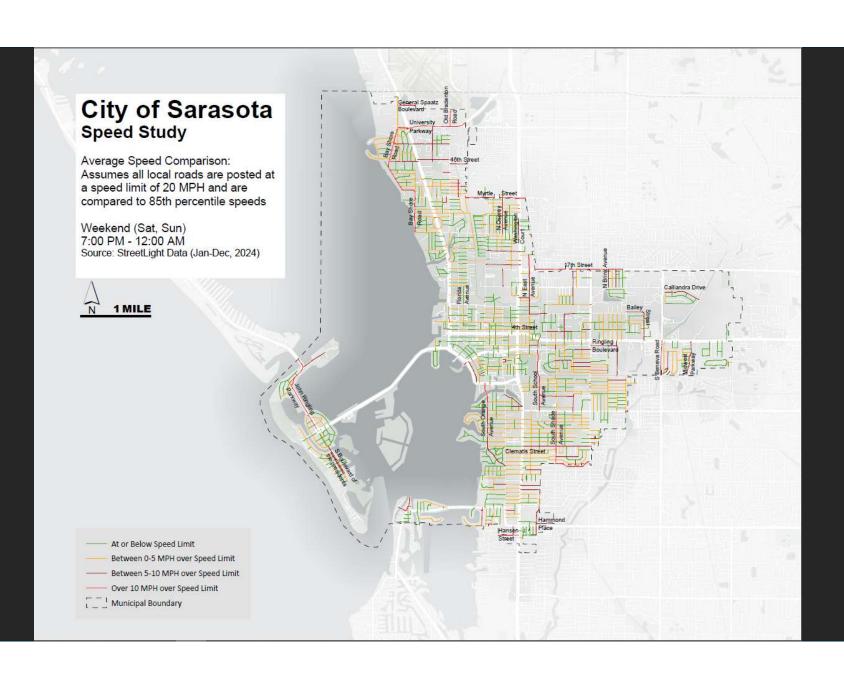












TAKEAWAYS

- A significant portion of crashes involving cyclists and pedestrians occur on major/minor collectors and arterials
- A significant number of roads experience 85th percentile over 10 mph over the posted speed in off-peak hours
- Results from the test model exploring local roads at 20 mph showed many roads experienced no speed differential
